he summer season has finally arrived and not a minute to soon. For some it is time to relax and catch up on those books you meant to read during the winter and spring. And for the kids, well, I'm certain it's their favorite time of year not having to get up at the crack of dawn – at least for a while.

Possumtown Park has been completely renovated and was rededicated and reopened in June. So many of our residents enjoy at least one of our 26 parks or playgrounds on a regular basis and now Possumtown has become our newest state of the art park. Stop over and you'll see what I mean.

We are so fortunate in Piscataway to have, for the last 20 years, a team of specially trained volunteers dedicated to community service as members of the Piscataway Domestic Violence Crisis Intervention Team. It would be nice to think that we don't need such a group in our community but, in fact, over these 20

years, they have aided close to 1700 Township families in crisis. The team was formed in April 1995 under the direction of then Chief of Police Pasquale LaRocca and Captain Richard Gregory, and they answered their first call in July of that year.

The mission of the team is to provide solace, aid, referrals, comfort and education to families in times of crisis as well to increase public awareness about the cause, prevalence, interventions and prevention of Domestic Violence. Every situation is held in strictness confidence. Through the years the team has evolved and expanded the services they offer from crisis counseling to community education. They also sponsor the "Yellow Dress" production, an antiviolence dating program, for the Piscataway High School 10th grade class, and three years ago introduced "Remote Control" to the 7th and 8th grade classes in all three middle schools. Remote Control focuses on teaching preteens how to recognize and build healthy relationships. And in October of each year, there is a "Silent Witness" display in the Municipal Building of a silhouette representing a Piscataway resident murdered during an act of domestic violence. The team has also financed monetary scholarships for high school seniors who have persevered in difficult family situations.

2015 TRASH CENTER COUPONS AND RECYCLING ID CARD The use of the **Township Recycling/ Trash Center is available only to Township home dwelling residents. REMINDER: *if you rent/lease your property, the tenants are entitled to Trash Center Coupons and Grass Coupons)*

Prior to entry into the Recycling/Trash Center residents **must present their Piscataway Recycling ID Card and Drivers License as Proof of Residency. The Center is located at the Municipal Complex between the Department of Public Works and the Police Department.

RECYCLING CENTER

- The **2015 Recycling ID Pass** entitles residents to enter with curbside recyclables: Commingled - bottles, cans, aluminum, #1 & #2 plastic, mixed paper, cardboard and newspapers.
- The Recycling Center also takes leaves, motor oil, 2 tires per trip, metal, auto batteries, rechargeable batteries, anti-freeze, vegetation, leaves, grass and branches for recycling. **Electronic Waste is also now accepted.**
- Branches are recyclable at curbside by appointment only from January to Mid October.
- Leaves are picked up at the curb bagged only in brown paper leaf bags from October to December.
- Grass Coupons will be required for disposal of grass and are available for purchase at the Tax Collectors Office in the Municipal Building from 8:30 am to 12:20pm and 1:30pm to 4:20 pm. Cost per coupon is \$1.00. Minimum Purchase: two (2) coupons. Each coupon is good for a 35-gallon container or bag. Larger containers will require two (2) or more coupons depending on size.

***Homeowners may schedule two (2) trash pickups, and one (1) branch pickup from January to mid-October. To schedule a pickup, call 732-562-2390.

COUPONS ARE VALID ONLY FOR THE YEAR IN WHICH THEY ARE ISSUED

TRASH CENTER

- Residents are mailed 4 Trash Center Coupons.
- A **coupon** is required for each automobile trip for disposal of household debris, carpeting, furniture, bagged brush, lumber, and all other acceptable non-recyclable materials.
- Kitchen garbage is **NOT** accepted.
- NO trucks larger than half- ton pickups are permitted.
- Pickup trucks and any vehicle towing a trailer are required to surrender 2 coupons per trip.
- Trailers cannot be larger than 4X8 feet.
- NO contractor debris, dirt, concrete, or other rock type debris is permitted.
- NO disposal of Hazardous Material, Toxic Waste or Consumer Electronics is allowed.
- Any violations are subject to fines as provided for in the Piscataway Township Ordinance.

PISCATAWAY RESIDENTS: **IMPORTANT:** Sanitary

Sewer Issues. Products called "flushable wipes" tend not to disintegrate though they may be advertised as such. The DPW Sewer Division urges residents to refrain from using these products as they tend to interfere with the mechanism in the pumping stations requiring costly maintenance and repairs. Be aware, also, that it is **PROHIBITED** to connect sump pumps and roof leaders into the sanitary sewer system of your home or business. These flows must discharge into an approved storm water system.

TENNIS COURT RESERVATION SYSTEM - Between April and November, Township residents, 18 and older, can reserve a tennis court at Columbus Park only, for one hour per day, Monday – Friday, for play between 5:30 to 9:30 p.m. Court reservations are not required for weekends and all other weekday hours, and operate on a first-come, first- serve basis. Use of all other courts is on a first-come, first-serve basis. In order to reserve a court you must first register, in person, in the Recreation Department to obtain a "Tennis Identification Card". Proof of residency is required – there is no charge for the I.D. card, or to reserve a court. Once you have an I.D. card, registration can be made by calling the Recreation Office between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. (only) @ 732-562-2382.

COOPERATION: CLEANING UP THE SITES ONCE THOUGHT LOST By Senator Bob Smith

Five years ago I introduced legislation that would help clean up our Garden State, a program that already had been successful in states like Massachusetts. Governor Corzine at the time signed the law in 2009 and established a Licenses Site Remediation Program that is helping to clean up contaminated sites that have been the blight of local communities.

When this law passed it allowed industry professionals to take over some of the weight off of the New Jersey's Department of Environmental Protection by giving the professionals the opportunity to take over the cleanup of those hazardous sites. As a result, these companies no longer require the DEP to approve the minutia that may come about over the course of a cleanup project. That being said, the DEP has laid out standards and oversees the success of these sites by requiring that the Licensed Site Remediation Professionals (LSRPs) develop a Remedial Action "Work Plan (RAWP) for the cleanup of the site. Furthermore, LSRPs must have extensive experience and put their licenses on the line whenever they take over a site. In addition, the law also provided for penalties in order to increase the accountability which include but are not limited to fines and/or criminal penalties.

In addition to the DEP's oversight, the law created a state Site Remediation Professional Licensing Board to certify the professionals and investigate any complaints brought against LSRPs. According to the Board's website, out of the audits of 144 professionals, and 17 complaints, only four had a result other than a complete withdrawal or dismissal of the complaint (www.nj.gov/lsrphoard/index.html).


In addition to the cleanups, a multitude of benefits have come out of this new flourishing industry in our state. To encourage the next generation to join the ranks of LSRPs the Licensed Site Remediation Professional Association (LSRPA), a nonprofit organization, has pledged a \$10,000 scholarship to one or more students who have taken the initiative to study science or engineering related to environmental consulting, according to the association's website.

As of last October, there were 579 LSRPs licensed in the state and the number continues to grow. Furthermore, the number of pending contamination cases has dropped from some 20,000 in 2009, to 13,700 sites, according to the LSRPA. As the number of cases decrease, the opportunity for NJ companies to benefit the state increases. Over the short life span of this program New Jersey has seen over 5,000 sites get restored to an environmentally clean condition and come back on the inventory of available commercial property, creating new jobs in the process.
